DHS girls repeat as D-I champs

SACRAMENTO — With Laurynne Chetelat, Cheslea Reilly and Lauren Guierrieri's nearly guaranteed wins last season, the Davis High School girls track team was a lock to win the Division I title.

But with Reilly and Guierrieri graduated, the girls crown was hardly in the bag on Friday at the Sacramento Section Division I championships at Hughes Stadium.

Chetelat did her part, winning three events, and the rest of the Blue Devils responded as well as DHS held off Chavez by 20 points to repeat as champs. The top 10 finishers in most events advanced to next week's Masters trials, also at Hughes Stadium.

"You can't take it for granted because as coaches we can do everything we can every year, but it still takes a certain amount of luck to have the right girls place at the right

Crushers aid Devils' victory

SACRAMENTO — By no means was it pretty. In fact, one could make a strong argument that the Davis High baseball team should have lost its first-round playoff game against Vintage.

But despite all of the base runners allowed, the miscues in the field and the bats not getting much going, the Blue Devils fought through the triple-digit heat to pull out the victory at American River College. And getting the win, which came by a thin 5-4 margin and put DHS into the quarterfinals of the

Sac-Joaquin Section Division I playoffs, is all that matters on Suicide Saturday.

Luke McDonald had the game-winning hit for the Blue Devils (19-8-1), driving a 1-and-2, two out pitch into left center that scored Mike Kado and broke a 4-4

'Eaters steal one from Ags

He wasn't expecting it. And really, who would expect a team to call for a two-out, bases-loaded steal of home when its cleanup batter was standing at home plate with a chance to break open a tie game? Still, UC Davis catcher Jake Jefferies was in position to record a key out Saturday.

But like so many things on a frustrating afternoon for the Aggies, it got away. UC Irvine third baseman Eric Deragisch jarred the ball out of Jefferies' glove, as his attempted steal of home turned into the decisive run-scoring error. It was enough for the ninth-ranked Anteaters to beat UCD 4-3 on a sweltering day at Dobbins Stadium.

The result turns the heat up on the Aggies, who could use a win in today's series finale with the Anteaters to improve their postseason hopes. UCD (32-20, 11-9 Big West) is on the bubble for the 64-team NCAA Tournament, and a series victory over the highly regarded Anteaters would be another nice bargaining chip with

the committee.

"We'd like to win the series, that's really what the focus is," UCD head coach Rex Peters said. "Whether it leads to postseason opportunities, then it does. But we're just trying to win a series in conference."

The Aggies probably should have done that.

"We didn't have many quality at-bats with runners in scoring position, and that's what it comes down to," Jefferies said. "We win that ball game if we have more quality at-bats in those situations."

UCD left 11 men on base. It loaded the bases in three separate innings — twice with less than two outs — and failed to score each time.

It did all that against an Irvine team forced to reach into its bullpen for an untested starting pitcher on Saturday. Freshman Crosby Slaughter, who had three Big West innings under his belt, replaced scheduled starter Bryce Stowell (food poisoning) on short

Two legs complete for Big Brown

BALTIMORE — Not once but twice, jockey Kent Desormeaux sneaked a peek to see if anyone was gaining on Big Brown.

"I looked between my legs, under my arms, and they were eight (lengths) behind me," Desormeaux said. "I stopped pushing. I said, 'That's enough.'"

His big bay colt ran away with the Preakness on Saturday and now is pointed squarely down the path toward the Triple Crown.

The 3-year-old with the perfect record heads for the Belmont Stakes in three weeks as the fourth horse this decade to try for the triple, a sweep last accomplished by Affirmed in 1978. The last to try was Smarty Jones in 2004.

"Wow is all I can say," Steve Cauthen, who rode Affirmed, said by telephone from Kentucky. "He looks pretty special. It was like a cakewalk for him. The important thing to me is he keeps passing all the tests."

Trainer Rick Dutrow Jr., who called his shot at both the Kentucky Derby and the Preakness, sounded nearly as confident after Big Brown came back full of run after putting away the field of 11 with ease.

"I know we have horse left. There is no question," Dutrow said.

"He's just shown up every step, every way," he added. "I just can't imagine him not showing up for the Belmont."

As he did two weeks ago in a Kentucky Derby marred by the breakdown of Eight Belles, the colt named for UPS delivered another stunning win, this time by 5 1/4 lengths. Macho Again was second and Icabod Crane was third.

"We just got beat by a monster," said Julien Leparoux, who was aboard Macho Again. Big Brown slipped a bit

while breaking from the middle of an undistinguished pack and Desormeaux took him off the pace in front of 112,222 fans.

"He's so strong, he powered out with his back legs and they just slipped and he was standing out in the same spot," Desormeaux said. "It actually was his second push that let him out of the gate."

Big Brown was fourth the first time past the grandstand behind pacesetter Gayego. He moved up to third on the first turn, where he stayed all the way down the backstretch.

"My whole job in that first half-mile was to keep his face clean," Desormeaux said. "There's not a grain of sand on most of his body."

The decisive moment came just before the final turn, when Desormeaux angled Big Brown out three-wide for clear running room. As he hit the top of the stretch, Desormeaux simply crossed the reins to let Big Brown know it was time to take off.

He didn't even need the whip, which he initially left behind in the jockeys' room. He could have saved himself the trip back to get it. His horse covered 1 1/16 miles in 1:54.80.

"This is the best horse I've ever ridden," Desormeaux

said.

That's saying something. In 1998, the jockey rode Real Quiet to wins in the Derby and Preakness only to be denied Triple Crown immortality when Victory Gallop stuck his nose in front at the wire in the Belmont. The final jewel is also the longest of the three races, a grueling 1 1/2 miles that proved the undoing of War Emblem in 2002, Funny Cide in 2003 and Smarty Jones the next year.

"We should have the horse to get the job done," Dutrow said.

Big Brown went off as a shorter priced favorite than Secretariat in 1973, who went on to win the Triple Crown, capped by a stunning 31-length victory in the Belmont.

"It looks like Big Brown might win the Belmont farther than Secretariat," said Paddy Gallagher, who trained 10th-place finisher Yankee Bravo.

Penny Chenery, Secretariat's owner, said she plans to be on hand for the history making try on June 7.

"I don't know whether Secretariat can stay with him or not," she said. "I won't speculate how that would come out, but that long a distance. But you

ATLANTA — The Oakland Athletics finally got some much-needed offense.

Jack Cust hit a solo home run and Ryan Sweeney added a three-run shot, and the Oakland Athletics held on to beat the Atlanta Braves 5-4 on Saturday night to end a season-worst four-game losing streak.

The A's had only three extra-base hits — all doubles — during their losing streak and had scored only four runs. They entered the game with 22 home runs, third fewest in the majors.

Oakland broke out unexpectedly with Sweeney hitting his first homer. It came off Tim Hudson, who had allowed only one all season prior to Saturday.

time," DHS coach Spencer Elliott said. "It's nice that we can take advantage of it and capitalize on it, but it's fun. You can't take it for granted because it doesn't happen too often."

The temperatures soared to 100-plus degrees as athletes from all over the section felt the effects. Chetelat noted it was fortunate races like the 3,200 were run after the sun was going down and with the Delta breezes kicking in.

Elliott was maybe most pleased by the girls 4-by-400 relay where DHS runners Melinda Zavala, Josephine Devanbu, Elliana Bisgaard-Church and Rebecca Hammond took third in 3:59.86, the final event of the day.

"I want it to be (more of a tradition) and I'm hoping it's starting to be because it's a couple of years in a row now where we've been in the top three and scoring points there," Elliott said.

Chetelat, one of the top 3,200 runners in the nation, won that race in 10 minutes, 44.13 seconds over Folsom's Maria Malone (10:51.28). The Stanford-bound senior won the 1,600 (5:01.36) and the 800 (2:16.56) as she makes another bid to be the state champion in California in the 3,200.

"I had two really big goals today," Chetelat said. "I wanted to do whatever I needed to do to get ready for the 3,200 since that's what I'm going to be doing at state. The second goal was for the team and what we could do to win sections for girls. The two goals really overlapped."

The DHS boys finished 10th overall in a division won by Jesuit.

The boys 3,200 race was an intriguing one for the Blue Devils as Kenny Durell led through six laps before eventually being passed by Roberto Rosas of Grace Davis, Mitchell Mulligan of Sheldon and Kurt Ruegg of Napa. Durell's fourth-place time of 9:52.13 still qualified him for next week's Masters trials.

"Workouts have been just killer," Durell said. "I know I have the fitness out here to run at that pace and hold it up so it was sort of a test to see what I've got. It felt great for four of five laps."

The boys 3,200 was a strong one for the Blue Devils in general as three of Durell's teammates — Dillon Shaw, Matt Peterson and Drew Peterson — also finished in the top 10.

Corey Coates led in the early stages of the boys 800 but he re-aggravated an ankle injury and collapsed after reaching the finish line, set-

DHS had a number of other top performances on the girls side. Hammond and Zavala, who ran two legs on the third-place relay team, had strong individual races as well.

Hammond was second to Chetelat in the 800 (2:17.82), and Zavala was third in the 400 with a season-best time of

58.28 seconds.

Meanwhile, Kaitlin Clancy was third in the triple jump (37 feet, 1 inch), and Juliana Green was fourth in the 1,600 with a personal-best time of 5:12.39.

Sam Mintzmeyer was fourth in the boys discus with a throw of 149 feet, 1 inch.

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Turco leads Stars in Game 6

DETROIT — Marty Turco was surrounded by teammates in front of the net at Joe Louis Arena. For the first time in his NHL career at the Joe, they weren't there to console him.

Turco made 38 saves to lift Dallas to a 2-1 win over the Detroit Red Wings on Saturday in Game 5, extending the Western Conference finals after losing the first three games of the series.

"It's probably the best I've felt in this building ever," he said.

His timing was perfect. Turco had been 0-9-2 as a pro at The Joe after starring in college at Michigan, going 18-5 in the storied venue along the Detroit River.

Trevor Daley scored in the first period and Joel Lundqvist had a go-ahead

goal on an assist from Turco in the second to help the Stars pull to 3-2 in the suddenly tight series.

Game 6 is Monday night in Dallas. If necessary, the final game will be Wednesday night in Detroit.

"We've proven that we belong in this series — and this building as well," Stars center Steve Ott said.

The top-seeded Red Wings insist pressure is not mounting on them after a 3-0 lead made them look like a lock to reach the Stanley Cup finals for the first time since winning a title in 2002.

The Stars have a shot at making history as the third team to win an NHL playoff series after trailing 3-0. The New York Islanders did it 33 years ago — 33 years after the Toronto Maple Leafs pulled off the feat.

tie in the bottom of the sixth.

"We survived and that's all there is to it," DHS coach Dan Ariola said. "You come over here and all you want to do is advance and that's exactly what we did. ... We got through today and the guys will settle down and we'll probably play a little better on Monday."

The Blue Devil pitchers were working out of the stretch for the entire afternoon as Vintage (13-14) had no shortage of players on the base paths. The Crushers had at least two runners on base at once in six of the seven innings.

It was Vintage's inability to drive in those runners, along with some poor baserunning, that may have cost it the game.

Brendan Gill got the start for DHS and never got into a groove. He allowed a pair of one-out singles in the first before getting counterpart Matt Bejar to hit into a double play. The Crushers loaded the bases in the second but Gill struck out lead-off hitter Ethan Speizer to end the threat.

The defensive play of the game came in the fourth.

Vintage had runners on first and third with one out when A.J. Borja was asked to lay down a suicide squeeze. Borja missed the ball and Turay ran up the third-base line to tag out the oncoming John Accardo. He then fired the ball to second to gun down Mike Jones to end the inning.

The Crushers also had a runner thrown out at third in the fifth and sixth innings, which helped mitigate the damage done.

"That was a huge play by Mike (in the fourth)," Ariola said. "We dodged a bullet that inning. We kept making plays like that to get out of innings."

Turay's play also seemed to breathe some life into the Blue Devil bats.

Cody Keefer smacked a one-out single to left and

Kyle Williams was hit by a pitch which put multiple DHS runners on base for the first time in the game. After Gill flew out, Robbie Bronzan's grounder scooted through the hole and into left to plate pinch-runner Cody Chambers. After an error on a pickoff throw advanced the runners, Scott Malinoff lined a single over a leaping Speizer at short to make it 3-0.

With the Blue Devils up 4-2 going into the sixth, a pair of errors from McDonald at short aided Vintage in knotting the game at 4-4 against reliever Trevor Cecil.

But the sophomore would redeem himself in the bottom half of the frame. Gill led off with a single and Kado was brought in to pinch run. A pair of wild pitches advanced Kado to third and after a pair of strikeouts, McDonald hammered a Bejar offering into the gap in left center.

It was only fitting that Vintage would make it interesting in the seventh against reliever Marcus Zuercher. Two singles to start the inning a one out walk loaded the bases but Zuercher induced a pair of pop-ups to end the game.

"I thought he was going to throw me another curveball but he threw a fastball and gave me one up high," McDonald said. "He had been throwing me curveballs all game and hadn't throw me a fastball."

DHS faces Pleasant Grove on Monday. The Eagles got two runs in the bottom of the seventh, including the game-winner on a wild pitch, to beat Fairfield 3-2 in the opening game.

The two teams squared off on April 1 with Pleasant Grove winning 11-10. The Blue Devils scored four in the top of the ninth before the Eagles came back with five in the bottom half to win.
